






side and the marsh side where you camp. Little Talbot Island offers five miles of beautiful beaches. With two parking areas and five boardwalks,



access to the beach is easy. Three bathhouses and outdoor showers are also provided for your beach enjoyment.

When we were there we were the only people on the beach and the shells were plentiful. I love to walk along the edge of the ocean and find just those special shells. I was able to find some sea anemone and sand dollars, always



my favorites.

Growing up in Fort Lauderdale as a child, one of my fondest memories was on Saturdays we would get up early and go to the beach to watch the sunrise and walk the jetties. The highlight was while my Daddy cooked breakfast for us on the beach my sister and I would see who could find the prettiest shells. Getting there so early we had first chance to pick up the best shells. I guess that is why I like these more natural beaches because that is the way I remember the beach as a little girl. No crowds, just peace and quiet in the early morn.





The campground is nestled among ancient dunes in a lush maritime hammock of live oaks, American holly and southern magnolias. Each of the 40 campsites has 20 and 30 amp electricity and fresh water, fire ring and picnic table. The campground offers a laundry facility and two bathhouses with hot showers. Both restrooms are ADA accessible. A dump station is available for RV campers.

Your bicycles will be a great asset to you here. Bicycling can be enjoyed throughout the park, whether you prefer to stay on the paved two and a half mile Park Drive, or ride along the hard packed sand of the beach.

A limited number of bicycles are available for rent at the Ranger Station. We hadn't brought ours on that trip but must remember to take them next time.

The marsh side of Little Talbot has a very nice camp ground with the lots being very private. The beautiful live oak trees with the Spanish moss dripping everywhere is just majestic. Combine that with the vistas of the marsh with the gold grasses and still water, you just have to relax. In the time frame we were there (January-February) there were not any bugs to bother us. The park is full of beautiful birds and animals. Terry was having a "hooting session" with an owl that was nearby and we were able to walk to it and get a glimpse before it flew away.





Canoe and kayaking is very popular in this area. Long Island Outfitters is Talbot Islands State Park's canoe and kayak visitor service provider located on AIA between Little Talbot and Big Talbot Islands. The service is operated by Kayak Amelia and offers everything from basic rentals to special focus guided trips. This is something that I really want to try on my next trip down there. So maybe by then I will be in better shape to try this fantastic looking sport.

We went out to eat per the Ranger's suggestion of great seafood. Singleton's Seafood market and restaurant was the freshest

seafood around. It is on the Mayport side of the St. John's river about 50 yards south of the ferry dock. From Little Talbot you just go South and the Ferry entrance is on the left side of the road. The ferry ride was \$5 one way and goes twice an hour (check schedule). You don't have to take the ferry back if you want to take the road back around to the mainland. Makes for a fun outing and tummy full of wonderful seafood, we even had leftovers for another day. Happy Camping to all of you!



MEMBER MAINTENANCE TIPS OR THINGS WE LEARN THE HARD WAY

GET READY FOR THE SUMMER HEAT

• The air return filter(s) need to be cleaned and/or replaced frequently. Shine a flashlight up into the air return to determine whether dirt has accumulated on the filter(s). The filter area is small, so it is not unusual that you would need to clean the filter(s) on a weekly basis during times of heavy air conditioner use.

• Do not over tighten the rooftop unit to the inside unit. Just snug the four bolts holding the two parts together. The bolts are accessible by removing the inside cover. Try to compress the foam roof gasket as little as possible. If water leaks in from the roof, try tightening just a little more. If it still leaks, replace the rooftop air conditioner gasket (available at most RV stores).

• Other items, such as the condenser, the evaporator, the fan motor, and capacitors must be serviced from the roof. To inspect and work on these, turn off the air conditioner's 120-volt-AC power at the breaker box or just unplug the motorhome from shore power. Determine whether it is safe to climb on the roof. (This may be best left to a professional service technician.) In particular, do not go up in windy, wet, or stormy weather, and make sure to wear the proper clothing and shoes. Remove the air conditioner shroud to service these items. There are two sets of coils on the roof. The one you will see when you first remove the shroud is the condenser and can be cleaned easily with water or compressed air. Be sure that you do not get water into the electrical area. The other coil, the evaporator, is located inside the evaporator housing. If you ever get that moldy, cave-like smell in the motorhome when first starting the air conditioner, this is where that smell is coming from, and it needs to be cleaned. This is likely a once-a-year job when the motorhome is stationed in a humid area where the air conditioner is used frequently and the evaporator stays wet much of the time. Use a professional evaporator cleaner, available at any HVAC store, and an old toothbrush. While you are on the roof (with the power still off), check all electrical connections. Also, inspect the electrical capacitors to make sure they are not deformed or leaking. Do not touch the terminals on the capacitors, as they do retain a charge even with the power off.

• Some fan motors have oil ports on each end of the motor; others have sealed bearings. If your air conditioner has a fan with oil ports, add three (and not more) drops of light machine oil or sewing machine oil to each port. Also, ensure that the fan motor is tight on its mounts. Finally, check and remove any mud dauber nests or other debris that can throw the fan off balance or short out the electrical connections. Follow these simple preventive maintenance steps and you should enjoy the cooling capabilities of your rooftop air conditioner through the sweltering days of summer.



The following important information contributed by Tom Jackson:

WARNING-WARNING-WARNING

If your CARBON MONOXIDE MONITOR, is five (5) years old, it may not be working.

To test- turn on the coach batteries. Look to see if the green light is blinking. It will take ten(10) minutes for the unit to warm up and then self test. Now press the test button for one(1)second. The alarm should sound and go back to solid green. If the alarm fails or there is a red/green solid light on continually the unit must be replaced.

On all Chinooks with a rear door- there is the possibility that the gasket on the bottom of the door is missing or torn. Take a piece of paper and close it in the bottom of the door and then try to pull the paper out to see if it is tight. If the gasket (weather stripping) is not in place, CARBON MONOXIDE can enter into the coach when driving or when you are running the generator.

NOTE: on all replacement SAFE-T-ALERT CARBON MONOXIDE units there is a statement on the front panel that reads "REPLACE BY 60 MONTHS AFTER RETAIL SALE. June 2012

PARTS LOCATOR

For any of us who have had difficulty locating parts, it would be beneficial to everyone to share this information. Recently Russ had to be transported a 100 mile roundtrip for one part. While we can't avoid this type of inconvenience on the road, we can have the information ready to obtain replacement parts.

In this case, to obtain "OEM" for your Stainless Steel "Versaliner" Wheel Covers, parts are listed on Dicor's website. (Dicor is the manufacturer) Here is the website: https://dicorproducts.com/resources/for-rv-owners.php or you can contact them by phone: 800-837-2059. Parts may be obtainable through other RV suppliers but having the right part number helps!

If you have part information for something that is OEM on your Chinook, why not share it with the club! We'll post it here in future issues.
