

#### From Bob & Marcia:

We left from Prince Rupert (leaving at 4:45 AM but the kicker was we had to be there to check in, do customs and get in line 3 hours prior) to Ketchikan . The ferry was delightful many places to choose from for seats/ viewing. Of course it rained but the scenery was gorgeous.

Two days in Ketchikan (bears, eagles, and salmon running) and we boarded another ferry for Sitka with short stops in Petersburg and Wrangell on the way. Again, we left at 4:45 AM but this time we only had to get there 2 hours early (no customs) for our overnight adventure. We all made for our cabins and some sleep. The trip was cloudy and rainy but the scenery was to die

for. We saw seals, whales in the distance, an otter on its back and glaciers. In fact the captain had two of the crew gather some ice for drinks for us. Man that made our scotch taste really special. 24 hours later we landed in Sitka---you guessed it, 4:45 AM! Before I forget, in Ketchikan, 6 of us took a bus/boat tour to watch them pull Dungeness crab ending with an "as much as you could eat" gourmet crab dinner. We were all in agreement--the BEST crab we had ever eaten!!

Our final day in Sitka and we are parked downtown at the info center in the rain. We have decent WiFi and cell phone for a change ! So far, Sitka is my favorite city/town, beautiful setting, bear refuge, great fish and nice people. In fact all the Alaskans we've met have gone way out of their way to be helpful. Tomorrow we take a high speed ferry to Juneau. We leave at 1 pm--YEA!!! These rides have saved us about 600 to 700 miles already and are getting us set for the hard stuff.

#### From Steve & Judie:

Sitka has been called one of the most beautiful cities in the world. It's right on the water with huge snow topped mountains surrounding it, and little islands all around. We are at a small municipal RV lot right on the water, over a bridge from down town so we can walk back over the bridge and cruise around the town. Every other shop is a gift shop, lots of them with Russian themes since we bought Alaska from the Russians.

It took a 24 hour ferry ride to get here from Ketchikan, which we also got to by ferry from Prince Rupert, BC, Canada. The dogs had to stay in our RV the whole time but there were a couple of stops on the way so we got to take them for short walks. They did great. We had a fun ride, saw some whales from a distance, and some glacier ice bergs – small aqua blue chunks of ice floating in the ocean. 10,000 year old ice, as the captain said. He sent a couple of crew members out in an orange boat to chip off some for us so we could see it up close

The price of food up here is astounding. Bananas are \$1.10 a pound, bread \$5 a loaf. We are eating lots of salmon but even that is between \$10 - \$15 a pound. Halibut is \$20 a pound. Both are worth it though. Most folks here just catch their own – everyone fishes, it seems. It feels like it's the main topic of conversation. Gas is much less expensive than Canada which was about \$5 a gallon, and it's \$4 here – practically a bargain!



Back in Hyder, Alaska, we went to a place where salmon are spawning and bears come to catch them. We watched (from an overlook) a female grizzly catch a fish, then she went upstream to catch another. We lost her around a bend in the stream and as we were walking back to the parking lot along the walkway built for pedestrians, she suddenly came out of the brush on the other side of the road, big fish in her mouth, and walked straight at us. I was so busy backing up and fumbling for my camera that I didn't get a picture of her straight on, but she went under the walkway (whew!) and I got a picture as she went into the woods.

We have another day and a half here, and then we take another ferry to Jueau. From there, we're back driving, heading towards Denali with lots of stops on the way.





















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## VP of Membership News

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MEMBER MAINTENANCE TIPS . . . . OR THINGS WE LEARN THE HARD WAY

All of us have to be very innovative in our little Chinook homes on wheels. I wanted to share some of my "savers" and I know you all have lots of ideas too. We need all the help we can get when we are without full hookups!



### THINGS I DO IN OUR CHINOOK THAT I THINK SAVES RESOURCES

1. Use paper plates, but I still have to use real silverware and not the cheap paper plates. Really saves on dish washing with that valuable water going down the drain. I have even splurged for paper bowls because the water saving is so good! I especially like the electric skillet, it is so versatile if I have electricity and with the Teflon coating I can just wipe it out for easy clean up.

2. Cooking outside on the grill is wonderful no matter what. If there is no electricity and hot it sure keeps the camper cooler too. I also carry a small iron skillet that is multipurpose, can cook anything in it from the camper gas cooktop to the outside grill.

3. Make your leftovers a wonderful Chinook meal. We have a vacuum sealer that I love. Anytime you have leftovers just put them in a small vacuum package in a size that fits perfectly in the Chinook freezer. Then on that camping day when you just don't feel like cooking... Viola! Just pull out the frozen meal for either warming up in the microwave or a pot of boiling water in your homemade vacuum sealed boiling bag. This saves you time and money, not to mention those valuable resources.

4. Making the little wet bathroom work. The first thing I do is put the shower curtain completely around the tract and pull the shower curtain over the commode. This way you don't get the whole bath wet. I try to conserve water so I quickly spray the hand shower over me and turn it off and put some water in the sink. I then soap up with the sink water. When through with that I start the shower again to rinse off. Clean up as all the water is let out of the sink. Be sure all water goes down the drain if you're Chinook is un-level. I then pull the shower curtain back and don't have wet walls and commode. Makes clean up so much easier and really saves water.

5. Add LED lights. We've added one in each of the fixtures because they are so expensive. Will try to get them all replaced eventually, but they really save the battery at night.

6. I found some really nice plastic containers that are rectangles and when not in use they fit inside the larger one. Brand is *Snapware* and found it inexpensive at *Ross* but also have seen at *Bed, Bath and Beyond*. The tops are locking, containers are waterproof, safe for microwave and freezer, multi-sizes. I love them because they stack and you can get so much more in the little fridge (mine is the small one door variety!). Great space saver and MADE IN THE USA!

7. Get that Golden Age National Park Pass just as soon as you can! It will reward you many, many times over with the splendor and beauty that is all over our great country!

Can't wait to get out on the road again!

## **MILEAGE SURVEY**

The earliest model Chinook in the club with top mileage is a 1997 Concourse SE with 162,548 and they are the original owners. (A 1996 was sold with 167,000) The most current Chinook with the top mileage is a 2005 Glacier Diesel with 55,000 miles. In between we have three 2002 Concourse models with 151,000, 135,000 and 128,000! Go 2002!

In total, there are 9 units out of 63 responding over 100,000 miles. Only 2 have under 20,000.

The lowest mileages and years are 2004 Destiny with 8,500 ; 2000 Concourse with 15,000 and a 1997 Concourse with 31,367.
